# REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COMMISSION MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 23, 2013 @ 5:30 P.M. CITY COMMISSION CHAMBERS, 214 S. LOVE STREET

**Present and answering roll call:** Mayor Drummond, Commissioners Trujillo, Gandy, Granath, and Benge.

**Also present:** City Manager James Williams, Assistant City Manager Jared Cobb, Finance Director Mashell Stephens, City Clerk Carol Ann Hogue, Chief of Police Danny Bryant, and City Attorney Mike Newell.

Not Present: City Attorney Patrick McMahon

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order by Mayor Drummond at 5:30 p.m.

Invocation: Commissioner Gandy gave the invocation

Pledge of Allegiance: Commissioner Gandy led the pledge

**Approval of Agenda:** Mayor Drummond asked for a motion to approve the agenda as submitted. Commissioner Trujillo so moved to remove the 2013-3-PERA Municipal Plan. Commissioner Granath seconded. Motion was approved.

**Approval of the Regular Minutes of September 9, 2013:** Mayor Drummond asked for a motion for approval of the regular minutes of September 9, 2013. Commissioner Gandy so moved. Commissioner Granath seconded. Motion was approved.

# **NON-ACTION ITEMS:**

**Discussion of Ordinance 516** – **Solicitors, Canvassers & Peddlers:** City Manager Williams addressed the Commissioners stating that the ordinance will omit Chapter 5.40-Solicitors, Canvassers, and Peddlers of the Lovington Municipal Code. This particular chapter deals with solicitors, canvassers and peddlers. In addition, this ordinance will amend Chapter 5.56 which pertains to Transient and Itinerant Vendors. The amendments include adding solicitors only into this chapter, as well as language adjustments. Changes are identified and submitted for review by the Commissioners. "Solicitors" means a person who goes from door to door visiting single-family or multi-family dwellings and businesses, or who is on the streets and parking lots of the City for the purpose of taking or attempting to take orders for the sale of goods, wares, merchandise, services, subscriptions, or personal property of any nature. A solicitor may travel by foot, automobile, or any type of conveyance. Solicitors may not travel door-to-door by commercial vehicle or semi-truck in any residential zone within the City. The City Clerk shall so certify in writing and a license shall be issued by the City Clerk. The City Clerk shall keep a record of all such licenses and of such complaints and violations.

City Manager Williams stated that this item will be an action item on the next regular meeting on October 14, 2013. No action was taken.

**Discussion of Traffic Speed on West Gum Street:** Commissioner Gandy stated that he was approached by a citizen about the traffic congestion on Gum Street & Dearduff. Commissioner Gandy would like to discuss methods on how to slow traffic on the corner of Gum Street and Dearduff which includes heavy trucks to school buses. He is open to suggestions. Commissioner Benge agrees on the expansion of roads at the truck by-pass. Mayor Drummond said that the City does need to think for the future for a bypass. No action was taken.

**Discussion of Street Light on 1000 Block of West Avenue K:** Commissioner Granath was approached by Mrs. Yarbro about no street light on that block. Commissioner Gandy did state that it's very dark in that area. Mayor Drummond asked City Manager Williams to look into the cost of street lights. Commissioner Gandy suggested to the City Manager Williams to do an inventory on street lights. No action was taken.

# **ACTION ITEMS:**

**Consideration of Approval of College Addition, Block 12 Final Plat (Corner of Van Buren & Eddy):** Mayor Drummond called for a motion to approve the College Addition Final Plat. The Lovington Planning & Zoning Board has recommended for approval on September 4, 2013. Commissioner Trujillo so moved. Commissioner Benge seconded. Motion was approved.

**Consideration of Approval of Variance for Carport Setback – 1105 W. Tyler:** Mayor Drummond called for a motion to approve the variance for carport setback at 1105 W. Tyler. The Lovington Planning & Zoning Board has recommended for approval on September 4, 2013. Commissioner Granath so moved. Commissioner Benge seconded and a vote call was taken: Mayor Drummond; aye, Commissioner Granath; aye, Commissioner Trujillo; aye, Commissioner Gandy; nay, and Commissioner Benge; nay. Motion was approved.

**Consideration of Approval of Summary Plat** – **Shields-Robinson Subdivision** (**Commercial & Ave K**): Mayor Drummond called for a motion to approve the summary plat – Shields/Robinson Subdivision. City Manager Williams addressed the Commissioners stating that the property owner is wishing to subdivide 9.1 acre tract of land into two separate tracts. The Lovington Planning & Zoning Board has recommended for approval on September 4, 2013. Commissioner Trujillo so moved. Commissioners Granath seconded. Motion was approved.

**Consideration of Approval of City & Lea County Economic Development Agreement:** Mayor Drummond called for a motion to approve the City & Lea County Economic Development Agreement. City Manager Williams addressed the Commissioners stating that Lea County has allocated \$5,000 to the City of Lovington for fiscal year 2013-2014 for economic development. Commissioner Gandy so moved. Commissioner Granath seconded. Motion was approved. **Consideration of Approval of Resolution 2013-2-City & NMDOT Cooperative Agreement:** Mayor Drummond called for a motion to approve the resolution 2013-2-City & NMDOT Cooperative Agreement. City Manager Williams addressed the Commissioners stating that NMDOT will fund 75% (\$62,809.00) with the City matching being 25% (\$20,936.00) for the project. The City will also be responsible for any additional costs exceeding the estimated project cost. Commissioner Gandy so moved. Commissioner Granath seconded. Motion was approved.

**Consideration of Approval to Advertise Ordinance 512 – Off Street Parking:** Mayor Drummond called for a motion to approve to advertise Ordinance 512. City Manager Williams addressed the Commissioners stating that this ordinance will affect Zone A & Zone B. If the approval is granted, this ordinance will be presented to the Commission for formal adoption on October 28, 2013 at the next regular meeting. The Lovington Police Department and Code Enforcers will be enforcing this ordinance. Commissioner Trujillo so moved. Commissioner Granath seconded. Motion was approved.

**Consideration of Approval to Advertise Ordinance 513 – Annexation:** Mayor Drummond called for a motion to approve to advertise Ordinance 513. City Manager Williams addressed the Commissioners stating that this ordinance will affect each property owner in each zone within the City. Commissioner Trujillo so moved. Commissioner Gandy seconded. Motion was approved.

**Consideration of Approval to Advertise Ordinance 514 – Industrial Zone Changes:** Mayor Drummond called for a motion to approve to advertise Ordinance 514. City Manager Williams addressed the Commissioners stating that this ordinance will not allow further residential development in this zone. Commissioner Benge so moved. Commissioner Gandy seconded. Motion was approved.

**Consideration of Approval to Advertise Ordinance 515 – Annexation of 26.4 Acres NE of 17<sup>th</sup> & Brian Urlacher:** Mayor Drummond called for a motion to approve to advertise Ordinance 515. City Manager Williams addressed the Commissioners stating that he was approached by a member of the Roberts Family Trust petitioning to annex approximately 26.43 acres located North East of the intersection of 17<sup>th</sup> Street and Brian Urlacher. The Lovington Planning & Zoning Board has recommended for approval on September 4, 2013. Commissioner Granath so moved. Commissioner Benge seconded. Motion was approved.

# **PUBLIC COMMENT:**

Jacob Lujan addressed the Commissioners to invite them to a Revival in the Parks in the month of October.

Judge Finger of the Magistrate Court addressed the Commissioners about new electronic equipment and applications from Apple Products. Judge Finger suggested updating the devices for the Detectives with the new devices to make it easy to get a Judge signature for a search warrant.

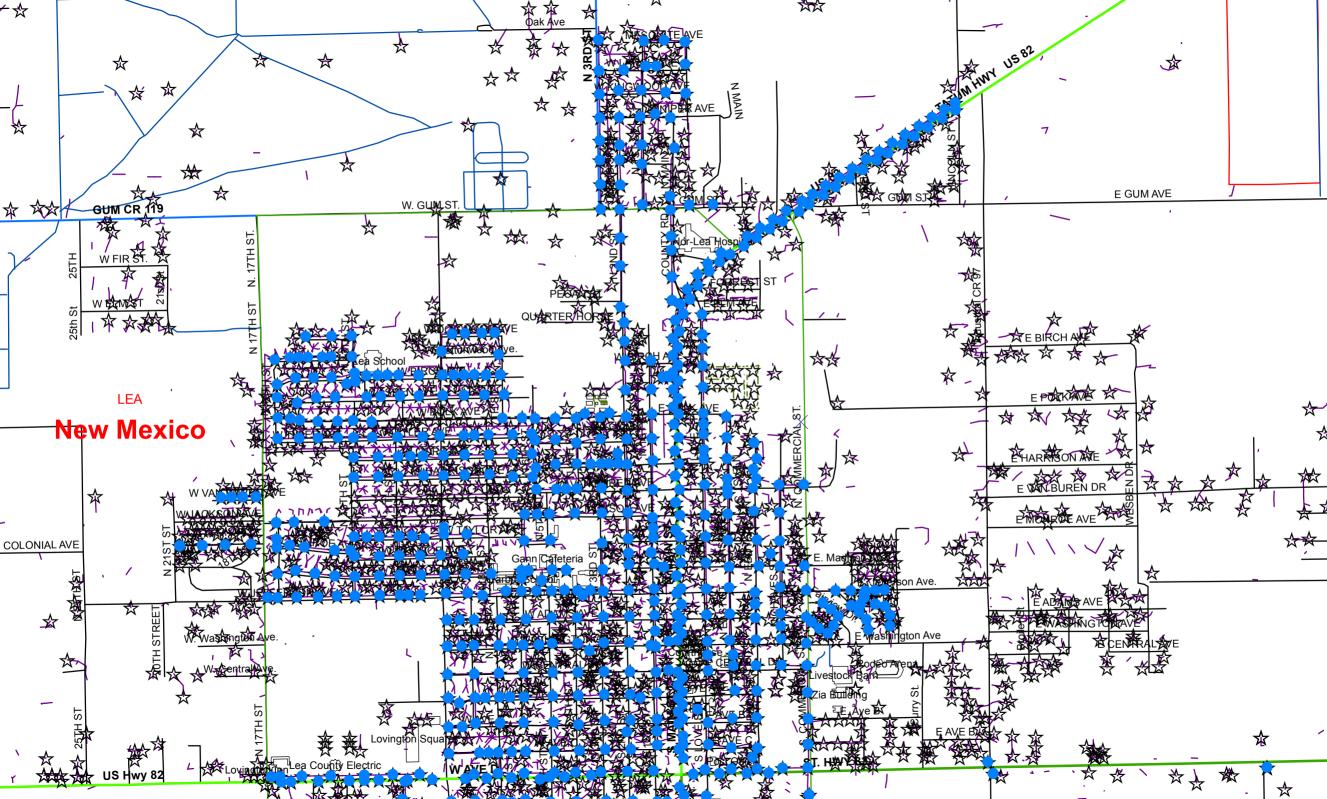


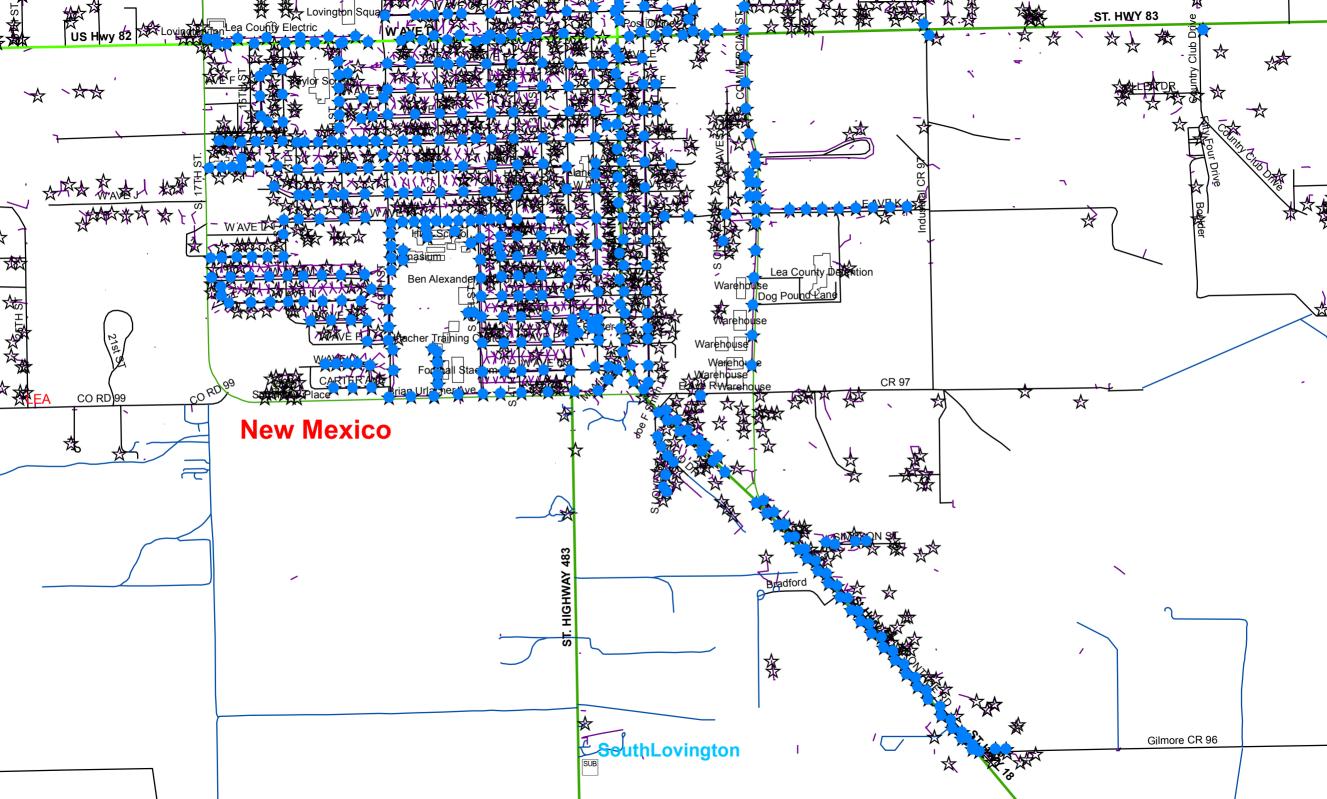

STAFF SUMMARY:
Staff have researched the costs associated with street light operation. The City contacted LCEC to review not only our monthly bill, but to provide us with a map of street light locations.
Residential lighting is the bulk of our monthly lighting bill, with a total of 789 (150W) lights throughout the City. The City is also responsible for the lighting along Avenue D and Main Street. These sections are illuminated using 230 lights (310W). The cost associated with these lights are located in the fiscal impact section.
Staff have also evaluated the attached map and have determined that the average distance between residenti light poles is 310 feet. We have also contacted other municipalities who have policies in terms of light placem and it varies from 300 feet to 600 feet between light poles.

#### <u>LEASE</u>

**THIS AGREEMENT**, made and entered into this  $\frac{D^{1/2}}{2}$  day of <u>Febrary</u>, 1998, by and between the Lovington Municipal School District No. 1, party of the first part and hereinafter referred to as the lessor, and the City of Lovington, New Mexico, a Municipal Corporation, party of the second part and hereinafter referred to as the lessee, **WITNESSETH**:

That for and in consideration of the covenants and agreements hereinafter mentioned to be kept and performed by the lessee, the lessor does hereby lease and let unto the lessee the following described real estate in Lea County, New Mexico, to-wit:

> The surface estate of a tract of land in Lovington, New Mexico described as beginning at a point 80 feet East of the Northeast Corner of Block 5 of the Dean Addition to the City of Lovington, New Mexico, thence East 334 feet, thence South 493 feet, thence West 334 feet, and thence North 493 feet to the point of beginning,

to have and to hold the same from the date of execution of this lease until the thirty-first day of December 1998, it being agreed, however, that this lease shall be automatically extended from year to year, i.e., from January 1st of one year to December 31st of the same year at an annual rental of One Dollar (\$1.00), provided that either party may terminate this lease at the end of any calendar year by giving the other party written notice of such termination at least one year in advance of the date of termination.

#### 2.

The lessee agrees to pay as rent for the said demised premises the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) for the primary term above mentioned and thereafter the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each year the said lease is extended.

### 3,

It is understood and agreed that the said premises shall be used for public park and recreational purposes. The lessee shall be entitled to level and rework the surface of the said premises so as to make same suitable for such purposes and shall be entitled to install appropriate recreational and park improvements and facilities specifically including such items as ball diamonds, rest rooms, bleachers, and other items incidental thereto. All such improvements so installed by the lessee shall be removed by the lessee prior to the ultimate termination date of this

lease, and the premises left level and clean.

Lessee hereby agrees to keep and save harmless the lessor from any and all liability, claims or suits for damage or injury sustained upon said premises or upon the sidewalks or streets adjoining the same, by any person or persons, from any cause whatsoever that does not involve acts or omissions, during the term of this lease, and all extensions thereof.

#### 5.

This lease shall not be assigned nor the premises sublet.

## 6.

This agreement shall extend to and be binding upon the successors of both parties hereto.

# City of Lovington Policy Regarding Inflatable Structures in City Parks

## I. Purpose

The City of Lovington has developed the following inflatable structure policy for the purpose of minimizing damage to park turf and irrigation systems from inflatable set-ups and maximizing the safety and enjoyment for park users.

## II. Definition

Inflatable structures are used for the sole intent of recreational purposes to include, but not limited to:

- Bounce houses
- Castles
- Slides
- Water slides
- Jumpers
- Any similar structure

## III. Users

- A. It is the responsibility of the party hiring the inflatable structure company to obtain a written permit from the City of Lovington and to inform the selected company of the exact site location, date, and time for set-up of the inflatable structure.
- B. Only vendors approved by the City of Lovington may be utilized. Use of personal jumpers is prohibited.
- C. Permit applications for use of an inflatable structure must be submitted two weeks in advance of the event; however, the submission of an application does not guarantee availability. The adjacent shelter or amphitheater must also be reserved.
- D. Permit applications shall be accompanied by a one-hundred dollar (\$100) refundable deposit. The Parks Department will inspect the site after the event for damage to the turf, facilities, and proper disposal of refuse. Deposits will only be refunded if the site is returned in good condition.
- E. Permits must be posted in a visible location (i.e. on the inflatable structure) for the duration of the event. The vendor listed on the permit must be used.
- F. Commercial use is prohibited. Permit holders shall not charge a fee to use the inflatable structure.
- G. Individuals and their immediate family members will be limited to one inflatable structure permit per thirty (30) day period.

### IV. Vendors

All vendors must be approved by the City of Lovington. To receive approval the vendor must have a current City of Lovington business license and submit proof insurance with minimum liability coverage of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), with the City of Lovington included as an additional insured. The list of approved vendors will be available on the City website or upon request at City Hall.

## V. Allowed Sites

Inflatable structures are only permitted at Chaparral Park. Approved sites include the space to the immediate south of the main shelter and the north side of the amphitheater. Only one inflatable structure is allowed per site.

## VI. Inflatable Structure Setup

- A. Vendors are to adhere to manufacturer guidelines in regards to anchoring the inflatable structure. If stakes are used, the Applicant is responsible for any damage to turf, irrigation system components, or improved surfaces.
- B. Placement of inflatable structures is limited to the site listed on the approved application.
- C. Inflatable structures may not be set up the night prior to an event or left overnight in a park.

### VII. Damages

The applicant is responsible for any damage to park property incurred due to inflatable structure use, including damage to the turf, irrigation system, improved surfaces, or electrical connections and wiring. Liability for damages is not limited to the one-hundred dollar (\$100) refundable deposit.

### VIII. Park Rules and Regulation

The applicant shall be responsible for adhering to all park rules and regulations as posted at the park and outlined on the City website.

## ORDINANCE NO. 517

An ordinance of the City of Lovington, New Mexico, amending Title 12, Chapter 12.28 – Public Park Regulations.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LOVINGTON THAT TITLE 12, CHAPTER 12.28 BE AND HEREBY IS AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

## The title of this Chapter is amended to Public Park and Recreation Facility Regulations

## 12.28.010 Remaining in public parks overnight prohibited – Exceptions.

It is unlawful for any person to remain in, occupy, or use any public park in the municipality between the hours of 11 p.m. and 4 a.m., unless present in the furtherance or enforcement of this chapter or irrigation or maintenance of park lands and, or unless authorized by other provisions of this chapter.

### 12.28.015 General Rules – Parks facilities

- A. No peddling, soliciting or commercial enterprise is permitted in a municipal park except by approval of the City.
- B. Disorderly conduct, abusive language, noisy disturbances or disregard of these rules and regulations will be grounds for immediate removal of person(s) from the municipal park by the Lovington Police Department or as authorized by the City Manager.
- C. Park users are responsible for the conduct of and any damage to the park or its equipment caused by their legal dependents or other minors in their care at the time.
- D. Children under eight (8) years of age shall not be left unattended in any park.
- E. No person shall consume or have in their possession any intoxicating beverage or other drug or narcotic prohibited by federal law.
- F. Air rifles, BB guns, firearms, bows and arrows, rockets, slingshots, fireworks, or other guns and dangerous objects such as golf equipment may not be possessed or used while in a municipal park.
- G. Wading or swimming in fountains or ponds is prohibited.
- H. Motor vehicles shall be operated and parked only in designated areas that are specifically designed for motor vehicles or for parking.
- I. Speed limits in municipal parks is ten miles per hour and must be observed at all times.
- J. Bicycles, roller skates, skateboards and other types of non-motorized vehicles must be used safely, and in compliance with all posted rules.

- K. No person shall ride or lead any horse or pony in any park without approval by the City.
- L. No animals are permitted in municipal parks unless they are on a leash, except in designated off-leash areas, and shall be kept under supervision at all times; and, are not allowed to run at large or to commit any nuisance.
- M. All animal waste shall be picked up immediately by the owner and placed in an appropriate waste disposal container.
- N. Littering is strictly prohibited. No person shall bring non-park generated trash into the park for the purpose of discarding of such.
- O. Fires are permitted only in grills. No other open fires are permitted on municipal properties without the permission of the City.
- P. Inflatable structures are permitted only in designated areas and by permit issued by the City.
- Q. It is unlawful to deface, destroy, or cause harm or damage to equipment, furniture, structures, trees, shrubbery, turf, signs, or wildlife.
- R. The city, its representatives and its employees are not responsible for accidents, injuries, or loss of property by fire, theft, wind, flood or other natural acts which are beyond their control. All equipment furnished within municipal parks is solely for the convenience of the user and is utilized at the risk of the user.
- S. Public events require a permit issued by the City. A permit application and a one-hundred dollar (\$100) deposit is required at least two weeks in advance. The Parks Department will inspect the site after the event for damage to the turf, facilities, equipment, and proper disposal of refuse. Deposits will refunded if the site is returned in good condition.
- T. Shelter reservations require two weeks advance notice. The pavilion and amphitheater located at Chaparral Park are the only shelters that may be reserved.

# 12.28.016 General Rules – Chaparral Lake

- A. State fishing license is required.
- B. Trout validation stamp is required November 1 through March 31.
- C. Unauthorized fish are not allowed to be placed in lake.
- D. Passenger watercrafts are prohibited.
- E. Wading or swimming in lake is prohibited.
- F. No trout or throw lines.

# 12.28.017 General Rules – Aquatic Facility

- A. Animals other than seeing eye dogs or assistance animals, are not allowed in the aquatic facility.
- B. Any person having an infection or communicable disease is prohibited from using the aquatic facility.
- C. All children under the age of eight years of age must be accompanied by a parent or responsible adult supervisor.
- D. Persons having open blisters, cuts, etc. are advised to not use the pool.
- E. Running, pushing, boisterous or rough play, or excessive noise is prohibited in the pool area, shower, or dressing rooms.
- F. Spitting, spouting water, blowing nose, or discharging wastes in the pool is strictly prohibited.
- G. No glass containers or objects are allowed in or around the pool area.
- H. No gum or tobacco products are allowed in the aquatic facility.
- I. All infants are required to wear swim diapers.
- J. Appropriate swim attire must be worn if swimming or entering the pool.
- K. All individuals entering the pool must pay for entrance.

# 12.28.018 General Rules – Ballparks, athletic fields, recreation facilities

- A. No peddling, soliciting or commercial enterprise is permitted in a municipal ballpark, athletic field, or recreation facility except by approval of the City.
- B. Disorderly conduct, abusive language, noisy disturbances or disregard of these rules and regulations will be grounds for immediate removal of person(s) from the municipal ballpark, athletic field, or recreation facility by the Lovington Police Department or as authorized by the City Manager.
- C. Ballpark, athletic field, or recreation facility users are responsible for the conduct of and any damage to the park or its equipment caused by their legal dependents or other minors in their care at the time.
- D. Children under eight (8) years of age shall not be left unattended in any ballpark, athletic field, or recreation facility.
- E. No person shall consume or have in their possession any intoxicating beverage or other drug or narcotic prohibited by federal law.
- F. Air rifles, BB guns, firearms, bows and arrows, rockets, slingshots, fireworks, or other guns and dangerous objects such as golf equipment may not be possessed or used while in a municipal ballpark, athletic field, or recreation facility.
- G. Littering is strictly prohibited. No person shall bring non-site generated trash into a municipal ballpark, athletic field, or recreation facility for the purpose of discarding of such.

- H. It is unlawful to deface, destroy, or cause harm or damage to equipment, furniture, structures, trees, shrubbery, turf, signs, or wildlife.
- The city, its representatives and its employees are not responsible for accidents, injuries, or loss of property by fire, theft, wind, flood or other natural acts which are beyond their control. All equipment furnished within municipal ballparks, athletic fields, or recreation facilities is solely for the convenience of the user and is utilized at the risk of the user.

## 12.28.010 Remaining in public parks overnight prohibited— Exceptions.

It is unlawful for any person to remain in, occupy, or use any public park in the municipality between the hours of ten p.m. and four a.m., unless present in the furtherance or enforcement of this chapter or irrigation or maintenance of park lands and facilities, or unless authorized by other provisions of this chapter. (Ord. 309 § 1, 1981)

# 12.28.020 Parking vehicles overnight prohibited.

It is unlawful for any person to park a motor vehicle in any street, alley, or public thoroughfare, or on any street, alley, or public thoroughfare adjacent to any public park for purposes of camping or overnight occupancy. (Ord. 309 § 2, 1981)

# 12.28.030 Overnight occupancy of vehicle prohibited.

A. It is unlawful for any person to use or occupy a car, automobile, truck, trailer, camper or similar type vehicle or structure upon any public park, public parking area, street, alley, highway, or any public thoroughfare within the municipality for purposes of camping or overnight occupancy.

B. "Camping" means temporary quarters for shelter, lodging, or sleeping.

C. "Overnight occupancy" includes all of the following conditions:

1. One or more persons are sleeping in the vehicle or structure;

2. The vehicle has remained parked at such location for more than four hours;

3. No valid or legal purpose can be shown for such occupancy. (Ord. 309 § 3, 1981)

## 12.28.040 Tents prohibited— Exceptions.

It is unlawful for any person to set up tents or other temporary shelters on public parks or public thoroughfares, except for special circumstances when permission has been granted by the municipality. (Ord. 309 § 4, 1981)

# 12.28.050 Permission for overnight parking.

The municipality may authorize, permit or allow members of the general public, or any person to utilize public parks for overnight parking for periods not to exceed forty-eight hours at any one time; however, use of such public parks for periods longer than forty-eight hours shall be unlawful, whether the vehicles or structures are occupied or not. (Ord. 309 § 5, 1981) 12.28.060

## 12.28.060 Signs required.

No regulations in this chapter shall be effective unless signs giving notice of prohibitions or limitations are erected and in place at the time of any alleged offense. (Ord.  $309 \$  6, 1981)

#### 13.12.110 Collection date—Penalty.

All bills shall be due and payable on the first day of each month for the previous month's service. If such bills are not paid on or before the tenth day of the month, a penalty of ten percent of the amount of the bill shall be added. (Prior code  $\S$  4-3-10)

#### 13.12.111 Tampering with public utilities.

A. It shall be unlawful for any person to connect or attach or cause to be connected or attached, any kind of pipe, wire or other contrivance to any pipe, fire hydrant, line, wire or other conductor or appurtenance thereto, carrying gas, water electricity, television signals, telephone signals or other conveyances provided by or belonging to a public utility (whether publicly or privately owned) in such a manner as to enable such person or other persons to receive, consume or use gas, water, electricity, television signals, telephone signals or other utility service without the same passing through a meter, without obtaining the proper permit, without paying the required fee or in any other manner so as to evade payment for such public utility service.

B. It also shall be unlawful for any person to damage, tamper with or destroy any pipe, line, wire, meter or any other part of any public utility, including cable television, water, gas, electricity and telephone and telegraph systems.

C. If any meter, pipe, line, wire, fixture or other installation or appurtenance thereto provided by a public utility primarily for the purpose of serving a particular account is found to have been tampered with or altered in violation of Subsection A of this section, the person or other customer whose name appears on the records of the public utility affected as the person or firm responsible for payment of such account shall be held prima facie responsible for such violation.

D. Any act which, if uncorrected, would result in any utility customer being billed or charged by such utility for a lesser amount of utility service than actually furnished shall be deemed in violation of Subsection A hereof.

E. Conviction for violation of this section shall not affect the offenders civil liability for

damages done to facilities or responsibility to pay for gas, water, electricity, television signals, telephone signals or other utility service used but not paid for.

F. Anyone convicted of a violation of this ordinance, 13.12.111, shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars or imprisoned for not more than ninety (90) days, or both. (Ord. 445 (part), 2003)

#### Article III. Sewer Rates

#### 13.12.120 Definitions.

Unless the context specifically indicates otherwise, the meaning of terms used in this article shall be as follows:

"BOD" (denoting biochemical oxygen demand) means the quantity of oxygen utilized in the biochemical oxidation of organic matter under standard laboratory procedure for five days at twenty degrees Celsius expressed in milligrams per liter.

"Capital charge" means that portion of the total waste water service charge which is levied for local capital costs, local investment in plant facilities and other local costs excluding operation, maintenance and replacement costs.

"City" means the city of Lovington.

"Commercial customers" means those customers which have three or more living units served by a single water meter, or which have one or more businesses served by a single water meter.

customer" "Industrial means any nongovernmental, nonresidential user of a publicly owned treatment works which discharges more than the equivalent of twenty-five thousand gallons per day of sanitary waste and which is identified in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual under divisions A, B, D, E, I, Any nongovernmental user which discharges wastewater which contains toxic pollutants, poisonous solids, liquids or gases in sufficient quantities to contaminate the sludge, injure or interfere with the treatment system process, or constitutes a hazard which to humans or animals, creates a public nuisance, creates a hazard or has an adverse effect on the receiving waters.

"Infiltration/inflow" means the total quantity of water other than wastewater from both infiltration and inflow without distinguishing the source from defective pipes, pipe joints, connections, manholes, roof leaders, cellar drains, yard drains, area drains, foundation drains, drains from springs and swampy area, cross connections, catch basins, cooling towers, stormwaters, surface runoffs, street wash waters, or drainage.

"Living unit" means a residential unit providing complete, independent, living facilities for one family, including permanent provisions for living, sleeping, cooking, eating and sanitation.

"Municipality" means (1) a city, town, borough, county, parish, district, association or other public body (including an intermunicipal agency of two or more of the foregoing entities) created under state law having jurisdiction over disposal of sewage, industrial waste, or other waste; (2) a special district such as water, sewer, sanitary, utility, drainage or similar entity whose principal responsibility is the treatment, transport, or disposal of liquid waste of the general public in a particular geographic area.

"Normal sewage" means sewage which, when analyzed, shows by weight a daily average of not more than two hundred milligrams per liter of BOD and not more than two hundred milligrams per liter of TSS, and which is otherwise acceptable into the city's sanitary sewerage system.

"Residential customers" means those customers which have no more than two living units served by a single water meter.

"Surcharge" means a charge added to the normal user charge when the BOD, TSS, or other pollutant concentration from a user exceeds the range of concentration of these pollutants in normal domestic sewage.

"Suspended solids" means solids that either float on the surface of, or are in suspension in water, sewage, or other liquids, and which are removable by laboratory filtering.

"User charge" means that portion of the total wastewater service charge which is levied in a proportional and adequate manner for the cost of operation, maintenance and replacement of the wastewater treatment and collection system.

"Wastewater treatment system" means (1) the transport of wastewaters from individual homes or buildings to a plant or facility where treatment of the wastewater is accomplished; (2) to remove pollutants, dispose, recycle, or reuse the treated wastewaters and residues which result from the treatment process, and can include one or more connected or integrated treatment plants. (Ord. 311 § 1, 1982)

#### 13.12.130 Applicability of article.

This article shall take precedence over any terms or conditions of agreements or contracts between the city and the users, including, commercial, industrial, special districts, other municipalities, or federal agencies or installations which are inconsistent with this article. (Ord.  $311 \S 2, 1982$ )

# 13.12.140 Determination of use charges.

The city will apply charges for operation and maintenance pertaining to extraneous flows (i.e., infiltration/inflow) in the same manner that it distributes the cost of operation and maintenance among users or user classes for their actual use. (Ord. 311 § 3, 1982)

#### 13.12.150 Disposition of revenues.

The city will apply excess revenues collected from a class of users to the costs of operation and maintenance attributable to that class for the next year and adjust the rate accordingly. (Ord. 311 § 4, 1982)

#### 13.12.160 Use charge schedule.

A. There is levied on all persons, firms, corporations, organizations, political units and political subdivisions and all other entities using the wastewater collection and treatment system of the city, a schedule of charges as provided in this section.

B. Users connected to and served by the sewer system of the city shall be classified as either domestic, industrial or commercial.

C. The following schedule of charges, which include a portion designated as the user charge, used for payment of costs of operation and maintenance, and replacement, of the wastewater collection and treatment system, shall be amended as follows:

#### Residential use rates:

The rates set forth above shall be automatically adjusted to conform to periodic adjustments of the Consumer Price Index (C.P.I.). Rate adjustments will take effect September 15th of each year.

D. The monthly rates for sewer service furnished to domestic users shall be based on the average water consumption in the months of January, February and March.

E. All domestic users initiating service after April 1st of each year shall be charged on the basis of the water consumption of a typical user of the same or similar class and type of service until an average for the user is established for the following months of January, February and March.

F. The monthly rates for sewer services furnished to each commercial or industrial user shall be based on the water consumed by the commercial or industrial user each month at the rates set out in this section.

G. Users not connected to the city sewer system, including, but not limited to, septic tanks and cesspools, but who periodically discharge sewage into the city's sewage system, shall be charged the amount of two cents per gallon with the number of gallons being based upon the capacity of the container discharging its contents. (Ord. 484, 2007: Ord. 472, 2006: Ord. 442 (part), 2002; Ord. 427 (part), 2000; Ord. 421, 1999; Ord. 408 (part), 1997; Ord. 311 §§ 5---10, 1982) 13.12.170

#### 13.12.170 Maximum charge.

The charge for fifty thousand gallons per month shall be the maximum charge for water consumed and returned to the sanitary sewer system by residential users, public schools and the courthouse; all such water received from residential users, public schools and the courthouse in excess of fifty thousand gallons per month shall be received without charge; and, upon satisfactory showing by a commercial user that the water consumed by the user in excess of fifty thousand gallons per month does not reach the sanitary sewer system of the city, no fee shall be charged for all such water received in excess of fifty thousand gallons per month and shown to the satisfaction of the city not to reach the sanitary sewer system of the city; provided, however, that no reduction shall be allowed to any commercial user whose water consumption is less than an average of fifty thousand gallons per month. (Ord. 320, 1983: Ord. 311 § 11, 1982)

# 13.12.180 Additional costs for discharge of pollutants.

Any user which discharges any toxic pollutants which cause an increase in operation, maintenance and replacement costs shall pay for such increased costs. (Ord. 311 § 15, 1982)

#### 13.12.190 Surcharge schedule.

A. Every user who discharges sanitary sewage, industrial wastes, water or other liquids other than normal sewage shall be charged and pay a surcharge in addition to the charge for normal sewage.

B. The following surcharge schedule, which includes a portion designated as the user charge, will be implemented. The user charge portion is to be for the payment of the costs of operation and maintenance (including replacement) of the wastewater collection and treatment system. Charges shall be based on one hundred percent of metered water use in accordance with the following formula:

#### 13.12.200 User charge—Reviewed.

A. The user charge portion of the rate structure will be reviewed at least biannually to accomplish the following:

1. Ensure that the extant user charge rate is adequate to cover operation, maintenance and replacement costs;

2. Ensure that operation, maintenance, and replacement costs are being distributed proportionally among users and user classes.

B. The city shall notify each user annually in conjunction with a regular bill of the rate and that part of the user charge attributable to wastewater treatment services. (Ord. 311 §§ 14, 16, 1982)

#### 13.12.210 Billing—Delinquency.

Bills for the service charges for the use of the wastewater collection and treatment system by a premises shall be rendered to the person or legal entity designated by the owner, his agent, tenant or occupant to receive the water bill. The bills for the service charges for use of the wastewater collection and treatment system shall be rendered monthly and the due date to pay such bills shall be the same as the date for the water bill rendered to the name and address designated for such premises. When any wastewater service bill is ten days in default, rendition of water service to such premises shall be discontinued until such bill is paid following due notice and opportunity for hearing. (Ord. 311 § 17, 1982)

#### 13.12.220 Rate increases.

The rates shall never be reduced below an amount sufficient to provide for the operation and maintenance of the sewer system and for the payment of the principal of and interest on existing bonds, and shall, when necessary, be increased to provide for such operation and maintenance and for the payment of the principal of and interest on existing bonds. (Ord. 311 § 18, 1982)

# 13.12.230 All services to be charged for.

None of the facilities or services afforded by the sewer system shall be furnished without a charge being made therefor. In the event the city or any department, agency, or instrumentality thereof shall avail itself of any of the facilities or services so afforded, the reasonable value thereof shall be charged against the city, or such department, agency or instrumentality, and shall be paid for as the charges therefor accrue. The revenues so received from the city shall be deemed to be revenues from the operation of sewer system, and shall be used and accounted for in the same manner as any other revenues derived from its operation; provided, however, that nothing in this section shall be construed as requiring the city, or any department, agency, or instrumentality thereof to avail itself of the facilities or services afforded by the sewer system. (Ord. 311 § 19, 1982)

#### 13.12.240 Violation—Penalty.

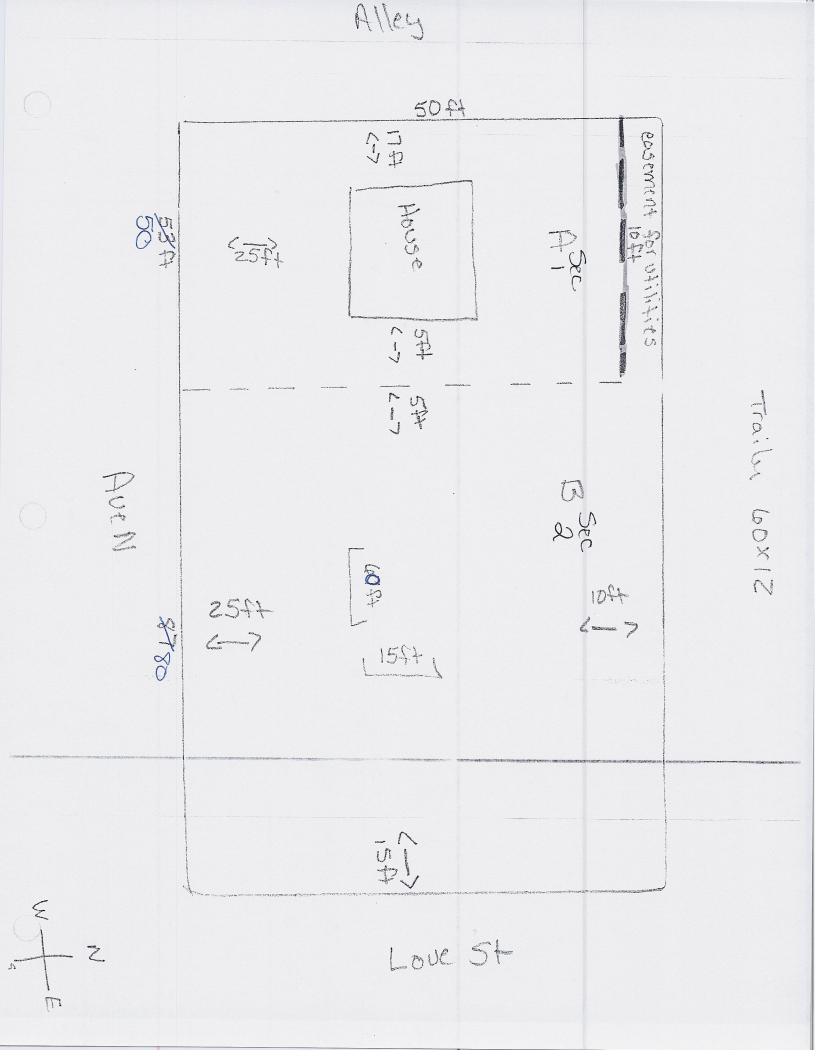
A. A person who continues discharging wastewater in violation of this article is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction is punishable by a fine of not more than two hundred dollars for each violation and for each day of violation.

B. In addition to proceeding under authority of subsection A of this section, the city is entitled to pursue all other criminal and civil remedies to which it is entitled under authority of statutes or other ordinances against a person continuing prohibited discharges. (Ord. 311 § 20, 1982)

 Being the lands petitioned and privately owned by the Roberts Family Trust as recorded in Book 1375, Page 512 in the office of the County Clerk, Lea County, New Mexico as identified in the filed plat (Attachment B) and contiguous to the Corporate limits of the City of Lovington as is more specifically described as:

The North half of the Southwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter (N/2SW/4SW/4), Less the North 20 feet thereof and the Southwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter (SW/4SW/4SW/4) Section 9, Township 16 South, Range 36 East, N.M.P.M., Lea County, New Mexico, being more particularly described as follows:

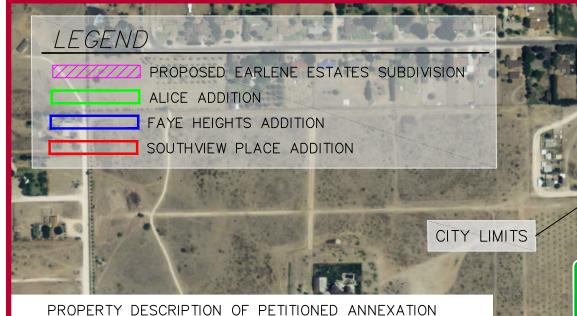

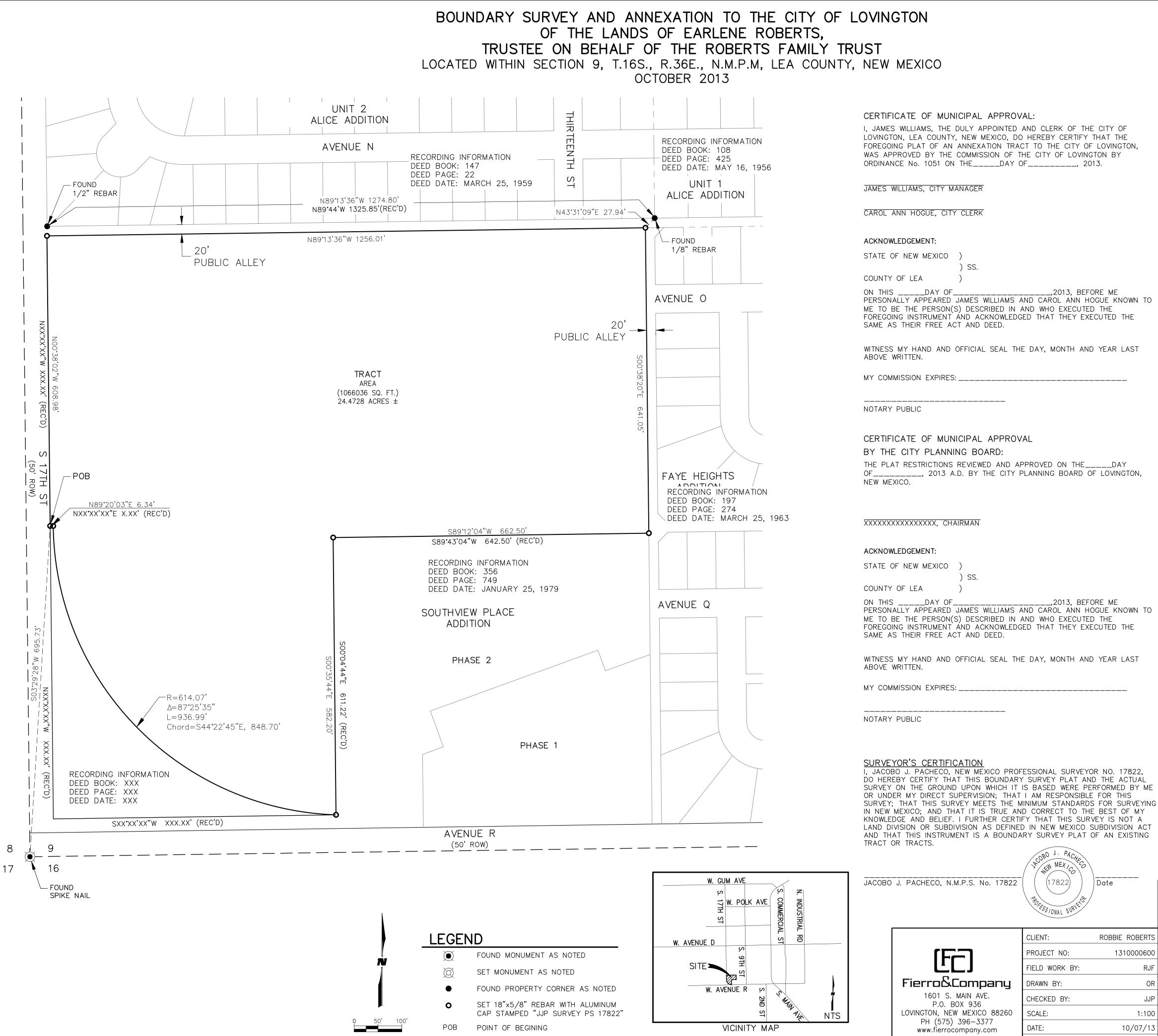

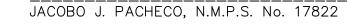

### **ORDINANCE NO. 516**

An ordinance of the City of Lovington, New Mexico, omitting Title 5, Chapter 5.40 – Peddlers, Solicitors, and Canvassers and amending Title 5, Chapter 5.56 Transient and Itinerant Merchants and Vendors, of the Lovington Municipal Code.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LOVINGTON THAT TITLE 5, CHAPTER 5.40 BE AND HEREBY IS OMITTED FROM THE LOVINGTON MUNICIPAL CODE.

FURTHERMORE, TITLE 5, CHAPTER 5.56 BE AND HEREBY IS AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

Title of Chapter 5.56 is amended to Solicitors, Transient, and Itinerant Merchants and Vendors.

### 5.56.010 Definitions.

For the purpose of this chapter, the following words and terms are defined:

"Group exhibit" means an association of five or more itinerant vendors under the auspices of a promoter, which association is formed fro the purpose of simultaneously conducting the business of the itinerant vendors upon a common site or premises.

"Promoter" means the person responsible for conducting a group exhibit.

"Solicitor" means a person who goes from door to door visiting single-family or multifamily dwellings and businesses, or who is on the streets and parking lots of the city for the purpose of taking or attempting to take orders for the sale of goods, wares, merchandise, services, subscriptions, or personal property of any nature. A solicitor may travel by foot, automobile, or any other type of conveyance. Solicitors may not travel door-to-door by commercial vehicle or semi-truck in any residential zone within the City.

"Temporary" means any such business transacted or conducted in the city for which definite arrangements have not been made for the hire, rental or lease of premises for at least thirty days in or upon which such business is to be operated or conducted.

"Transient" means such business of any itinerant vendor as may be operated or conducted by persons or by their agents or employees who have their headquarters in places other than the city, or who move stocks of goods or merchandise or sample thereof into the city with the purpose or intention of removing them or the unsold potion thereof away from the city before the expiration of thirty days.

"Transient merchant," "itinerant merchant," or "itinerant vendor" means any person, whether as owner, agent, consignee or employee and whether a resident of the city or

not, who engages in a temporary or transient business of selling, offering for sale, delivering or offering to deliver goods, wares and merchandise, or exhibiting the same for sale, or exhibiting the same for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof within the city, and who, for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof and who for the purpose of carrying on such business or conducting such exhibits either hires, rents, leases or occupies any building, structure, motor vehicle, tent, railroad box car, or enclosure in the city, or any room or space therein, or any other place whether enclosed or not including space upon any street, alley or other place within the city for the exhibition and sale of such goods, wares, merchandise, either privately or at public auction.

### 5.56.025 Solicitor License Required.

All persons, before entering into or upon a residential or business premises or the streets and parking lots within the City for the purpose of soliciting, shall make application with the City Clerk and furnish the following information:

- A. The name, local and permanent addresses, social security number, driver's license number, age, race, weight, height, color of hair and eyes and any other distinguishing physical characteristics of the applicant;
- B. The names, addresses and telephone numbers of persons or the officers, directors or registered agents for service of the organization, group, association, partnership or corporation who is the employer of or entity represented by the applicant.
- C. The nature of the goods, wares, merchandise, services, subscriptions, or personal property for which solicitations will be made;
- D. Two (2) one-inch by two-inch photographs of the applicant, taken within sixty (60) days immediately prior to the date of the filing of the application, showing the head and shoulders of the applicant in a clear and distinguishing manner;
- E. The fingerprints of the applicant which will be taken and kept on file at the Lovington Police Department;
- F. Completion of a statement as to whether or not the applicant has been convicted of any crime, misdemeanor, or violation of any municipal ordinance in the preceding five (5) years, the nature of the offense and the punishment or penalty assessed therefor.

### 5.56.030 Transient and Itinerant Merchants and Vendors Application – Contents.

Applicants for a license under this chapter shall file a written sworn application, no less than five nor more than thirty days prior to the time desired, signed by the applicant if an individual, by all partners if a partnership and by the president if a corporation, with the City Clerk showing:

- A. The name of the person having the management or supervision of the applicant's business during the time that it is proposed that it will be carried on in the city, the local address of the person while engaged in such business, the permanent address of such person, the capacity in which such person will act, that is whether as proprietor, agent or otherwise, the name and address of the person for whose account the business will be carried on, if any, and if a corporation, under the laws of what state the corporation incorporated;
- B. The fingerprints of the person having the management or supervision of the applicant's business or, in lieu thereof, at least three letters of recommendation from reliable property owners in the county certifying as to the applicants good character and business responsibility or other evidence which establishes to the satisfaction of the City Clerk the good character and business responsibility of such person;
- C. The place in the city where it is proposed that the applicant's business be carried on and the length of time during which it is proposed that such business shall be conducted as well as proof of ownership of the premises for this purpose and if all is satisfactory to the City Clerk;
- D. The place, other than the permanent place of business of the applicant, where the applicant within the six months next preceding the date of the application conducted a transient business, stating the nature thereof and giving the post office and street address of any building or office in which such business was conducted;
- E. A statement of the nature, character, and quality of the goods, wares or merchandise to be sold of offered for sale by the applicant in the city, the invoice value and quality of such goods, wares and merchandise, whether they are proposed to be sold from stock in possession or by sample, at auction, or by direct sale or by indirect sale or by taking orders for future delivery, where the goods or property proposed to be sold are manufactured or produced and where such goods or products are located at the time such application is filed;
- F. A brief statement of the nature and character of the advertising done or proposed to be done in order to attract customers and, if required by the City Clerk, copies of all such advertising, whether handbills, circulars, newspaper advertising or otherwise, shall be attached to the application as exhibits thereto;
- G. Whether or not the person having the management or supervision of the applicant's business has been convicted of a crime, misdemeanor or the violation of any municipal ordinance, the nature of such offense and the punishment assessed therefor;
- H. Credentials from the person for whom the applicant proposes to do business authorizing the applicant to act as such representative;
- Such other reasonable information as to the identify or character of the person having the management or supervision of the applicant's business or the method or plan of doing such business as the City Clerk may deem proper to fulfill the purpose of this chapter in the protection of the public good.

### 5.56.040 Investigation – Issuance.

Upon receipt of the application, the City Clerk shall cause an investigation of the person's business responsibility or moral character to be made as he or she deems necessary for the protection of the public good. If, as a result of the investigation, the character and business reputation appear to be satisfactory, the City Clerk shall so certify in writing and a license shall be issued by the City Clerk.

### 5.56.080 Recordkeeping.

- A. The City Clerk shall keep a full record in his or her office of all licenses issued. Such record shall contain the number of the license, the date the license is issued, the nature of the business authorized to be carried on, the amount of the license fee paid, the expiration date of such license, the place where such business may be carried on under such license and the name of the person authorized to carry on such business.
- B. The City Clerk shall deposit the record of fingerprints of the licensee, together with the license number, with the Chief of Police. The Chief of Police shall report to the City Clerk any complaints against any person licensed under the provisions of this chapter and any convictions for a violation of this chapter. The City Clerk shall keep a record of all such licenses and of such complaints and violations.

### 5.56.120 Licenses – Posting required.

- A. Transient or itinerant merchants and vendors issued a license under this chapter shall have their license prominently displayed in a conspicuous place on the premises where all sales exhibits are being conducted and shall remain so displayed so long as all merchandise is being sold in exhibit. Separate licenses but be obtained for each place of business and shall be prominently displayed in each business location.
- B. Solicitors issued a license under this chapter shall carry his or her license with him or her at all times while engaged in soliciting and shall display the same to any person who demands to see such license while he or she is so engaged.

### 5.56.125 Prohibited Acts

It is unlawful for any person to:

- A. Enter into or upon a residential or business premises or the streets and parking lots within the City under false pretense to sell any goods, wares, merchandise or services, or to solicit for any purpose;
- B. Remain in or on any residential or business premises after having been requested to leave by the owner or occupant thereof;

- C. Enter upon an residential or business premises to solicit, when the owner or occupant has displayed a "No Soliciting" or "No Solicitors" sign on such premises;
- D. Engage in the practice of soliciting in the City without a license or operating as a transient or itinerant merchant or vendor without a license required by this chapter;
- E. Use or possess an altered, forged or fictitious solicitor or transient or itinerant merchant or vendor license.

### 5.56.140 License – Revocation.

The licenses issued pursuant to this chapter may be revoked by the City Clerk after notice and hearing for any of the following:

- A. Any fraud, misrepresentation or false statement contained in the application for the license;
- B. Any fraud, misrepresentation or false statement made in connection with the selling of goods, wares, or merchandise;
- C. Any violation of this chapter;
- D. Conviction of the licensee of any felony or of a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude;
- E. Conducting the business licensed under this chapter in any unlawful manner or in such a manner as to constitute a breach f the peace or to constitute a menace to the health, safety and general welfare of the public.

### 5.56.160 Appeals

Any person aggrieved by the decision of the City Clerk in regard to the denial of the application for a license as provided in Section 5.56.040 or in connection with the revocation of a license as provided for in Section 5.56.140, shall have the right to appeal to the city commission. Such appeal shall be taken by filing with the commission within fourteen days after notice of the decision by the City Clerk has been mailed to such person's last known address, a written statement setting forth the grounds for the appeal. The city commission shall set the time and place for a hearing on such appeal and notice of such hearing shall be given to such person in the same manner as provided in Section 5.56.150 for notice of hearing on revocation. The order of the city commission on such appeal shall be final.

### 5.56.175 Exceptions – Solicitors

The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to solicitors:

A. Who visit any residence or business at the request or invitation of the owner or occupant thereof;

- B. Who are unpaid members of any civic or charitable organization who have an approved means of identification provided by such organization or who upon request can provide identification of the relationship with the civic or charitable organization;

#### AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

Client employs JSAI and JSAI accepts employment for the furnishing of various professional geologic and hydrogeologic services pursuant to the terms and conditions set forth in Appendix A of this Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the total Agreement between JSAI and Client.

No other expressed or implied warranty or representation, either written or oral, is made, included or intended in this Agreement.

#### Workmanship

It is understood and agreed that, by the terms of this Agreement, the Client is engaging the services of JSAI on matters involving geological and hydrogeological services as more fully outlined in this Agreement. JSAI will perform its service in accordance with local generally accepted geological and hydrogeological practices.

#### Insurance

JSAI maintains insurance for Workmen's Compensations; Errors and Omissions; General Liability Insurance; Public Liability and Property Damage within or in excess of statutory limits. Certificates for this insurance shall be provided to Client.

#### Fees and Invoices

County, New Mexico (hereinafter "County").

WHEREAS, the Lea County Recreational Master Plan (see Exhibit "A") was

developed by community leaders, Dekker/Perich/Sabatini and Market & Feasibility

Advisors; and

WHEREAS, the Recreational Master Plan was developed as a quality of life and economic development initiative; and

WHEREAS, the Recreational Master Plan recommends certain quality of life projects throughout Lea County; and

WHEREAS, outdoor park facilities (hereinafter "project") in the City of Lovington will have a positive impact on recreational opportunities for City and County residents; and

WHEREAS, the City of Lovington has created a parks and recreation committee (see Exhibit "B") to recommend park improvements to the Lovington City Commission; and

WHEREAS, outdoor park facilities can expand the identity of Lovington to be an even more desirable community where people want to work and raise a family; and

WHEREAS, this type of project can be a catalyst for significant, positive change for the residents of Lovington and Lea County.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed as follows:

# 1. <u>DESCRIPTION</u>

This project will improve existing or create new outdoor park facilities designed to encourage use by all ages. The project could be an entirely new or be located within an existing park that needs to be improved. Implementation of this project will illustrate a commitment to quality of life for all Lovington and County residents and will have a significant positive impact on recreational opportunities.

The park improvements may include, but not limited to:

- a loop trail
- playground
- splash pad
- skate zone
- fitness stations
- shelters
- picnic areas
- multi-purpose field
- restroom facilities.

# 2. DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION COST RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. City shall provide:
  - 1) Property for the project.
  - 2) If needed, procure professional design and construction services.
  - 3) Oversee project improvements.
  - 4) Procure necessary equipment to complete the project.
  - 5) Updates to the County Commission on the progress of the project.
- B. County will be responsible for:
  - 1) Providing \$100,000.00 for the project during the fiscal year 2013/2014.
  - 2) Providing technical assistance or input as requested by the City.

# 3. MAINTENANCE RESPONSIBILITIES

City shall be responsible for the maintenance of the park during the construction or renovation of the project and following the completion of the project.

# 4. FUNDING

County will transfer to City \$100,000.00 within thirty (30) days of execution of this MOU between County and City. Documentation specifying expenditure of \$100,000.00 for the project shall be submitted to County prior to May 31, 2014.

# 5. <u>TERMINATION OF MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING</u>

This Memorandum of Understanding shall continue in full force and effect, subject to written amendments as described herein, until terminated by a party. The terminating party shall give written notice to the other Parties at least one year prior to the effective date of the notice.

Upon notice of termination of this Memorandum of Understanding, the Party wishing to terminate the Agreement shall bear all costs involved with separating the systems.

# 6. <u>AMENDMENT</u>

Any amendment shall be in writing, executed and approved by the parties hereto and the Secretary of the Department of Finance and Administration.

# 7. <u>SEVERABILITY</u>

If any one or more of the provisions contained in this Memorandum of Understanding shall be for any reason held invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect other provisions hereof, and the Memorandum of Understanding shall be constructed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision had never been a part hereof.

# 8. <u>EFFECTIVE DATE</u>

This Memorandum of Understanding shall be in full force and effective upon execution and approval of all parties hereto and the Secretary of the Department of Finance and Administration.

# 9. <u>SURPLUS FUNDS</u>

Since this Memorandum of Understanding will be operated on a costreimbursement basis, there should be no surplus funds when the Agreement is terminated. To the extent there are surplus funds, the funds shall be returned to Lea County by June 30, 2014.
